Montana Aviation Conference in Missoula Huge Success!



The 2022, 37th annual, Aviation Organizations of Montana's Montana Aviation Conference was a resounding success! Governor Gianforte kicked off the conference on Thursday, March 3 at noon. The conference hosted a diverse group of presenters, speaking on topics from airspace, to medicine, search and rescue, safety, regulations, stories of adventure, and much more. Dr. Amy Hoover of Ellensburg, WA, who was recently named National Flight Instructor of the Year by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) was also honored at the Friday awards ceremony. In addition, two Wright Brothers Master Pilot awards were issued to two Montana Pilots Association (MPA) members: Rod Bitney of Kalispell, United States Air Force (USAF) and National Guard pilot, Airline Transport Pilot (ATP) certificate holder, former Certified Flight Instructor (CFI), and four-term Montana House Representative; and Rob Buckles of Bozeman, MSU graduate, who flew skydivers and charters, and retired from a career as Boeing 787 Captain for American Airlines. He now flies a Cessna CJ-4 out of Bozeman and his own Cessna 182, 310, and Taylorcraft. Congratulations to all three on these well-deserved recognitions!

Additional sponsors to the scholarship program stepped forward prior to the awards ceremony to offer a new scholarship, bringing the already record-high \$38,000 in scholarship awards to \$41,000 worth of scholarships! These awards were presented to 25 winners during the Friday afternoon luncheon and awards ceremony. Many of these scholarship recipients attended the conference, and got a taste of what their exciting futures hold.

Three excellent keynote speakers entertained and educated during keynote presentations: Tim Sheehy, Kerry McCauley, and Adrian Eichhorn. The exhibit hall was full, and nearly sixty students received a certificate of completion for continuing education. The Montana Pilots Association (MPA) partnered with Robert Peccia Associates and North Star Jet Center/ Neptune Aviation to offer a static display and social at the Missoula airport Friday afternoon. A famous DC-3 named Miss Montana, Montana Air National Guard C-130, Montana Army National Guard Blackhawk helicopter, and a Neptune BAe 146 air tanker were open for tours.

The 2023, 38th annual Aviation Organizations of Montana's Montana Aviation Conference is scheduled to be held March 2-4, 2023 at the Billings Hotel & Convention Center. We can't wait to see you there!

2022 Mechanics Refresher and IA Renewal at the Montana Aviation Conference in Missoula

Another successful Mechanics Refresher and Inspection Authorization (IA) Renewal Seminar was completed at the Montana Aviation Conference on March 4 and 5, 2022. IA's are required to receive 8 hours of recurrent classroom training between April 1 and March 31 if they do not meet the eligibility requirements of Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 14 Part 65.93. Over ninety people attended this year, several of whom are current Aircraft & Powerplant mechanic students in Montana, and others who came to learn more about aircraft maintenance. Nearly sixty mechanics received a certificate of completion. There were eight speakers, including two new speakers this year, and two from the Federal Aviation Administration. Aeronautics would like to thank all the speakers for their time and expertise to assist mechanics in providing better aircraft maintenance. A total of 18 hours of training was provided to allow the mechanics to complete all their training in one day, or choose the classes they wished to attend over both days, including the option of watching a video during the lunch breaks.

The Montana Aeronautics Division had the first state-sponsored IA renewal course in the nation in 1963 and have provided it annually since then. The IA Mechanics Renewal Seminar will be offered again next year at the 38th annual Montana Aviation Conference in Billings, MT, in early March.

Build a Hangar in a Beautiful Location!

Are you looking for a place to build a hangar? The Lincoln airport has recently received an additional taxi lane to provide more space for up to seventeen more hangar locations. There are two remaining hangar pads on the main taxiway that are ready to build on; they could be combined to build one large hangar. Also, the airport pavements received a fog and crack seal with new paint markings. The airport offers a 4,200-foot lighted runway with a wildlife perimeter fence and an electric access gate. 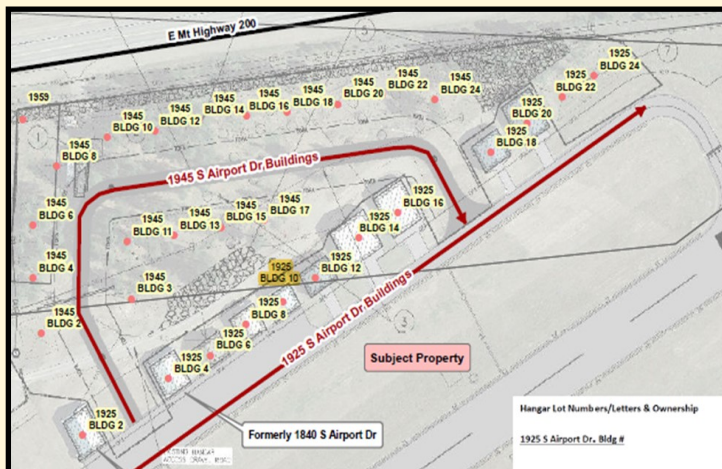

Airport Internship Assistance Program and Requirements:

1. Two \$5,000 airport internship assistance awards will be distributed annually.
2. Airport must be a member of MAMA and owned by a public agency.
3. Must have a full time manager.
4. Pay range for interns must be \$15 - \$20 / hr.
5. Airport will provide feedback on the performance of the intern and program to MAMA at the annual meeting.

It is recommended the airport also pay for Aircraft Rescue Fire Fighting (ARFF) training or other professional development opportunities.

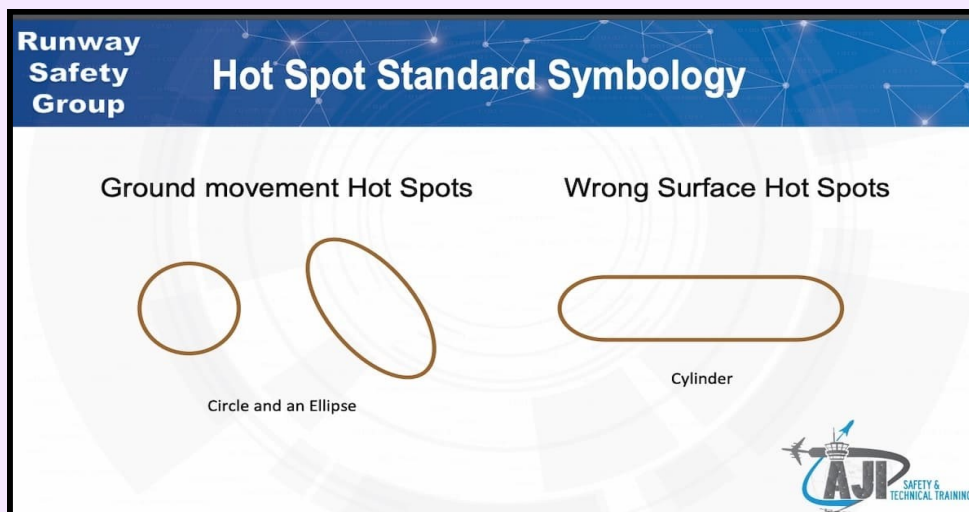

New Hot Spot Symbols Introduced



Beginning May 19, 2022, the Hot Spots on Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) charts will have three shapes with two distinct meanings. The Hot Spot symbology will be standardized, and a new Arrival Alert Notice also will be released, according to FAA officials.

The changes are in response to concerns from the FAA's Runway Safety team about how many pilots have misaligned to and even landed on or departed from a wrong runway, taxiway, and even a wrong airport.

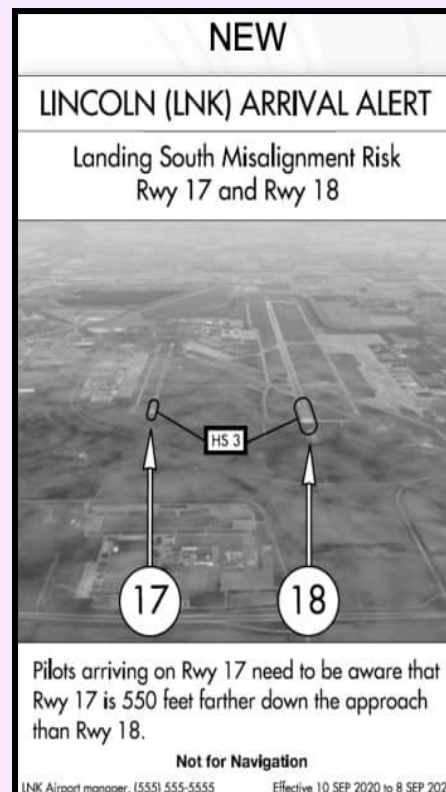
Hot spot identification is essential for pilots, particularly during preflight planning and while taxiing on airport surfaces. However, hot spots are currently depicted in a variety of shapes with no particular meaning.

On May 19, Hot Spots on the FAA's aeronautical charts and publications will have three shapes with two distinct meanings. Circles or ellipses will depict ground movement surface safety risk areas like taxiway/runway configurations and intersections. A cylinder will highlight wrong surface event risk areas, such as offset parallel runways (which remains a threat to many pilots).

These new Arrival Alert Notices offer a visual aid to pilots to enhance situational awareness when a Wrong Surface Hot Spot related to Arrivals is identified. There are 11 airports with Arrival Alert Notices which will be evaluated over a one-year test period. Don't think Montana pilots are off the hook; one of the test areas is only an hour flight down to Idaho and we do have wrong surface landings in our state.
