TRAFFIC REGULATIONS AND SAFETY RULES

- ### PLEASE DRIVE CAREFULLY
- Montana speed limits: Daylight—reasonable and prudent speed. Night: 55 miles per hour on completed sections of the Interstate System, and 50 miles per hour during the hours when lights are required, and all other highways, except during daylight hours on all other highways.
 - Motorcycles are to be operated with lights on at all times when operated on any public highway or street. Not more than two motorcycles shall be operated side by side in a single traffic lane.
 - Abandoning vehicles—No vehicle shall be parked or left standing for a period longer than 24 hours on the right of way of any public highway, way, or street (120 hours) on any city street, state, or county or city property.
 - Vehicles entering main highways must yield right-of-way.
 - Proper signal must be given when passing another vehicle, changing direction, stopping or starting down on the highway. Hand signals or clear hand signals shall be used at night when the road is wet or icy.
 - When approaching another car either front or rear, dim your lights.
 - Never drive at a speed greater than that at which you can stop in the clear road ahead. Slow down at night when the road is wet or icy.
 - Do not stop or park on the highway, pull out on the shoulder.
 - Accidents resulting in death, personal injury, or property damage of \$100 or more requires immediate notification to Sheriff, Police or Highway Patrol by quickest means of communication. This notice must be followed by a written report to Interstate Highway Patrol Bureau, Helena, Montana within ten days.
 - When approaching school buses loading or unloading school children, drivers must stop and not proceed until school bus resumes motion.
 - Littering upon or near highway prohibited. Punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.
 - PREVENT FOREST FIRES—USE YOUR ASH TRAY. During the Forest Fire Season vehicles entering forested areas must be equipped with ashtray, bucket, and axe, except when traveling numbered state and federal highways.
 - Montana highway regulations provide that no combination of auto and trailer shall exceed a total length of 96 ft. total outside width, or 12 ft. 6 in. in height except with permit. Trailers should carry red lights to the rear, green, amber, or white lights to the front and amber side lights. No person shall occupy a highway for more than 30 minutes.

POINTS OF INTEREST

- LAST CHANCE GULCH (E-4).** Gold was discovered on June 14, 1864, in the Last Chance Gulch area. The gulch was named because the gold was discovered in the gulch. The gulch is now a state park.
- RICHES HILL ON EARTH (F-4).** Gold, silver, copper and zinc have been mined and found in the Riches Hill area. The area is now a state park.
- CUSTER BATTLEFIELD NATIONAL MONUMENT (G-9).** June 25, 1876, Battle of the Little Bighorn. Custer and his 7th Cavalry were defeated by the Sioux and Cheyenne. The battle is now a national monument.
- HISTORIC SITTERBOTHAM VALLEY (E-2).** Sitterbotham was established in 1843. It was one of the first towns in Montana. The area is now a state park.
- DILLON AREA (G-4).** Fishing and hunting country. Ghost town of Barkham, gold was discovered in July 1892. The area is now a state park.
- GALLATIN EMPIRE (G-9).** Bozeman, named for John M. Bozeman, pioneer entrepreneur of the early 1850s. Montana State University, Montana Experiment Station, University of Montana, Northern Montana College, U.S. Public Health Rocky Mountain Laboratory.
- HUB OF FIVE GREAT VALLEYS (D-2).** Missoula, center of the five great valleys of Montana. The area is now a state park.
- FLATHEAD LAKE AREA (C-3).** Center of great west world of recreation and sports. The area is now a state park.
- TRIAL ARTS AND CRAFTS (B-11).** Popular over 3,000 people visit each year. The area is now a state park.
- GLACIER NATIONAL PARK (A-3).** Going to the Sun Road, an engineering masterpiece, overlooks the most spectacular scenery in the world.
- POMPEY'S PILLAR (F-7).** July 25, 1806, Capt. William Clark named the pillar after the early statesman. The pillar is still there.
- MAISON CAVEY BARTHOLOMEW AREA (H-5).** At 11:37 p.m. August 17, 1859 an awesome volcanic ash fall from Mt. St. Helens covered the area.
- MONTANA NATIONAL BISON RANGE (D-2).** Large herd of bison, also elk, pronghorns, white-tailed and musk deer. Conducted auto tours from late June until Labor Day.
- YELLOWTAN DAM AND BIGHORN CANYON NATIONAL RECREATION AREA (G-9).** Bighorn National Recreation Area. 500 foot mountainous cliff face. The area is now a state park.
- MUSEUM OF THE PLAINS INDIAN (E-3).** An exhibition and crafts center portraying the life of the Northern Plains Indians. The area is now a state park.
- COW CAPITAL OF THE WEST (E-11).** Range Riders Museum, a memorial to those who rode the unfenced range. Miss Montana College, Pine Hills School, Agricultural Experiment Station and Veterans' Administration. The area is now a state park.
- ST. MONIUS MISSION (D-2).** Established in 1854 for the Red River. The area is now a state park.
- MEDICINE ROCK STATE PARK (F-12).** 220 acres containing numerous weird and oddly shaped sandrock formations. A herd of wild horses. The area is now a state park.
- GEORGETOWN LAKE AREA (F-3).** Rock-hounding, ghost towns, scenic beauty, fishing, hunting, water sports, and a museum. The area is now a state park.
- CHEYENNE COUNTRY (F-10).** Northern Cheyenne Craft Center at Lama Deer. Authentic Indian arts, crafts and traditional public gaming including Tapes.
- SCORBY (A-11).** Daniels County Museum consists of a 17th-century building, a museum, a shop, a cafe, a homestead shack, church, school, shops, offices, auto antique tractor, farm machinery, cars and trucks.
