YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK
Yellowstone...not only America's biggest and oldest national park, but also the first national park in the world. Visitors enter the great natural preserve through three Montana entrances to wander in wonder through a world of geysers and steaming mountains, immense forests, a vast river-carved canyon, percolating mud pots, thundering waterfalls, horizon-wide lakes, and a living landscape of wild-world citizens like buffalo, elk, deer, moose, coyotes, swans, and opionated bluejays. Yellowstone's fine campgrounds and hospitable lodges are scattered over 3,500 square miles dedicated for the benefit and enjoyment of the people.
Yellowstone's summer season is from early May to mid-October, while winter activities run from December through March. For further information, contact the Superintendent, Yellowstone National Park, Wyoming 82190.

GLACIER NATIONAL PARK
Exhilarating Glacier National Park is a feet-on-the-ground, head-in-the-clouds world of its own. 1,600 square miles of wilderness, with hundreds of miles of backcountry trails...50 glaciers...200 lakes...dozens of waterfalls...alpine meadows jeweled with wildflowers...moose, elk, eagles, high-and-mighty Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep and wild goats...soaring peaks and granite ridges in breathtaking vistas that go on forever...and Going-to-the-Sun Road, crossing the Continental Divide at Logan Pass where nature's endless cycle of change centuries ago created an awe-inspiring panorama. Hikers' chalets perch on peaks, and Glacier's well-planned campgrounds and comfortable lodges invite travelers to linger.
Glacier is usually open from mid-June to late September, with guided cross-country ski-tours during the winter months. For further information, contact the Superintendent, Glacier National Park, Montana 59936.

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Montana State Parks, Monuments and Recreation Areas
BLAKE ELLIS BARRONS STATE MONUMENT - 1.5 miles north of Helena, Blaine County. The monument was established in 1934 to preserve the site of the Battle of the Clouds, a significant event in the history of the state. The monument is located on the east side of the town of Helena. The monument is open to the public and is a popular destination for visitors to the area.



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
