- ### POINTS OF INTEREST
1. LAST CHANCE GULCH (E-4). Gold was discovered on July 14, 1864. Today Territorial and present State Capitol, State Control Building and Historical Museum and Library, visitors will find a well-kept and interesting site. Last Chance Tour Train, Carriage, Veterans, Hospital, Mountain View School, State Library, Governor's Old Mansion, Vo-Tech Center, Montana College of Mineral Science and Technology, Vo-Tech Center.
  2. CUSTER BATTLEFIELD NATIONAL MONUMENT (G-9). June 25, 1876, Battle of Little Bighorn. General George A. Custer and his Seventh Cavalry were slain by the last man by the combined Sioux and Cheyenne warriors.
  3. FORT PEEK DAM AND RESERVOIR (C-10). Staining and fishing. World's largest hydraulically raised dam impounds the Missouri River. 1,000 acres of recreational area, over 1,000 miles of shoreline. Recreational areas, fossiliferous area, over 400 specimens on display in power plant museum.
  4. GATES OF THE MOUNTAINS (D-4). Discovered and named July 18, 1805 by Lewis and Clark. Steep cliffs rise to 3,000 feet above the Missouri River. Abundant with interesting wild life. Deer, bighorn sheep and mountain goats. Boat tours, fishing, water skiing.
  5. GREAT FALLS OF THE MISSOURI RIVER (C-5). Discovered in 1805 by Lewis and Clark. Great Springs State Park. Five hydroelectric dams. Gateway to Great Falls. Vo-Tech Center, Montana School of Arts and Blind, Manderson Av. Forest State, Cowboy artist Charles M. Russell original cabin and Art Gallery.
  6. LEWIS AND CLARK CAVERNS (F-8). Montana's first and best known park National and state. Features 200 foot high caverns in the Northwest. Colorful stalactites, stalagmites, columns and flowstone provide an exciting four hour guided tour.
  7. MONTANA CANYON EARTHQUAKE AREA (H-3). 11-37-37. August 17, 1895 an intense earthquake did not a major canyon in the canyon, creating a giant dam and Quake Lake. Memorial visitor center and museum.
  8. NATIONAL BISON RANGE (D-2). Large herd of bison, also elk, pronghorns, whitetail and mule deer, and many upland birds and waterfowl. Self-guided auto tours from late June until Labor Day.
  9. YELLOWTAIL DAM AND BIGHORN CANYON NATIONAL RECREATION AREA (D-9). Main-mountain 500 foot hydroelectric dam is spectacular Bighorn Canyon. Visitors Center, boat tours and recreational facilities.
  10. MUSEUM OF THE PLAINS INDIAN (E-9). An exhibition and crafts center portraying the life of the Northern Plains Indians "to the days the buffalo ran." Open through September under supervision of the Indian Arts and Crafts Board.
  11. COYOTE CAPITAL OF THE WEST (E-11). Range Riders Museum, a memorial to those who rode the unfenced range. Annual rodeo. Historic horse sale. Miles Community College, Free Hill School, Agriculture Experiment Station and Veterans Administration Hospital.
  12. ST. IGNACE MISSION (D-2). Established in 1854 for the Flathead. The greatest church in the West. One of the most beautiful in the world. A visit is a very rewarding experience.
  13. MEDICINE ROCKS (F-12). 230 acres containing numerous wild and oddly shaped rock formations. A result of wind erosion. Custer County Museum at Elkville exhibits series of prehistoric rock art.
  14. PHILIPSBURG ROUTE 167 (F-9). Anaconda, Georgetown Lake, Philipsburg. Drummond, fishing, hunting, camping, skiing, and scenic views. World's largest model truck at Anaconda Smelter.
  15. BROWN NATIONAL WILDLIFE (E-9). Abundant with resident and migratory waterfowl—Canadian geese, ducks of all species, colonial nesting birds, and seldom seen birds. Also antelope, deer and occasionally even elk.
  16. HUNGRY HORSE DAM (E-2). A 564 ft. high dam forms a reservoir surrounded by beautiful rugged peaks. Visitors Center. Recreation, boating, fishing, camping.
