


The Vision for Montana is Zero-

Relationship of Montana's Safety Plan (CHSP) with Agency Safety Plans & Programs



Key Elements

- Improve the accuracy, completeness, integration, timeliness uniformity, collection, and accessibility of data used in traffic safety analysis; and
- Collaborate across agencies, organizations and with the public to improve driver behavior, traffic safety, and promote Vision Zero, which are fundamental to our work to improve safety.



Fact

218 fatalities occurred on Montana's roadways in 2022.



The equivalent of passengers on 4 ½ school busses

Fact

65% of all roadway deaths are a result of a roadway departure



A roadway departure is defined as any instance in which a vehicle leaves the travel lane. It includes a non-junction, Head-On collision (HO), Side-Swipe Opposite Direction (SSOD), Fixed-Object (FO) or Roll-Over (RO). Fact

48% of all roadway deaths involved an unrestrained vehicle occupant



Unrestrained is defined as no or improperly restraint usage. An Unrestrained Vehicle Occupant includes all vehicle occupants regardless of seat position, and age and includes seatbelts, booster seats, and child passenger seats.



61% of all roadway deaths involve an impaired driver



An impaired driving crash is indicated on the crash form that one of the drivers was impaired by alcohol & / or drugs.


